

### Marine Department Notification

No. **268** / 2568 (2025)

Training Provisions on the Prevention and Response to Bullying and Harassment in the Maritime Sector, Including Sexual Assault and Sexual Harassment

As the International Maritime Organization (IMO) has adopted Resolution MSC.560(108) Amendments to Part A of the Seafarers' Training, Certification and Watchkeeping (STCW) Code, which amends the requirements under the International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers, 1978 (STCW), as amended, specifically in Table A-W/1-4 concerning the need for training provisions to prevent and respond to bullying and harassment in the maritime sector, including sexual assault and sexual harassment, under the Personal Safety and Social Responsibilities - PSSR: IMO Model Course 1.21 and the Refresher Course for Basic Safety Training, which will be in effect from 1 January 2026.

Therefore, In order to ensure that seafarers possess adequate preparedness, knowledge, and capability to prevent and respond to all forms of bullying and harassment, including sexual assault and sexual harassment, in accordance with the international obligations under the STCW Convention, by virtue of Clause 5 in conjunction with Clause 24, 25, and 114 of the Marine Department's Regulation on the certification of seafarers operating in ships engaged on near-coastal voyages and ships engaged on international voyages B.E. 2565 (2022), the Director General of the Marine Department has announced the prescription as follows;

Clause 1 Training institutions accredited by the Marine Department shall include the additional training provision on the Personal Safety and Social Responsibilities course, as specified in the amended Table A-VI/1-4 concerning Prevention and Response to Bullying and Harassment in the Maritime Sector, Including Sexual Assault and Sexual Harassment. The details are provided in the annex attached to this Notification.

Clause 2 Those who have completed the said course prior to 1 November 2025 shall undergo additional training on Prevention and Response to Bullying and Harassment in the Maritime Sector, Including Sexual Assault and Sexual Harassment from a training institution accredited by the Marine Department.

Clause 3 Those who have completed the said course on or after 1 November 2025 shall be deemed to have already completed the additional training on Prevention and Response to Bullying and Harassment in the Maritime Sector, Including Sexual Assault and Sexual Harassment.

## RESOLUTION MSC.560(108) (adopted on 23 May 2024)

## AMENDMENTS TO PART A OF THE SEAFARERS' TRAINING, CERTIFICATION AND WATCHKEEPING (STCW) CODE

THE MARITIME SAFETY COMMITTEE,

RECALLING Article 28(b) of the Convention on the International Maritime Organization concerning the functions of the Committee,

RECALLING ALSO article XII and regulation I/1.2.3 of the International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers, 1978 ("the 1978 STCW Convention"), concerning the procedures for amending part A of the Seafarers' Training, Certification and Watchkeeping Code ("the STCW Code"),

RECOGNIZING the need for training provisions to prevent and respond to bullying and harassment in the maritime sector, including sexual assault and sexual harassment,

HAVING CONSIDERED, at its 108th session, amendments to part A of the STCW Code, proposed and circulated in accordance with article XII(1)(a)(i) of the 1978 STCW Convention,

- 1 ADOPTS, in accordance with article XII(1)(a)(iv) of the 1978 STCW Convention, amendments to the STCW Code, the text of which is set out in the annex to the present resolution:
- DETERMINES, in accordance with article XII(1)(a)(vii)(2) of the 1978 STCW Convention, that said amendments to the STCW Code shall be deemed to have been accepted on 1 July 2025, unless, prior to that date, more than one third of Parties or Parties the combined merchant fleets of which constitute not less than 50% of the gross tonnage of the world's merchant shipping of ships of 100 gross register tons or more have notified to the Secretary-General of the Organization that they object to the amendments;
- 3 INVITES Parties to note that, in accordance with article XII(1)(a)(ix) of the 1978 STCW Convention, the amendments to the STCW Code annexed hereto shall enter into force on 1 January 2026 upon their acceptance, in accordance with paragraph 2 above;
- 4 URGES Parties to implement the amendments to section A-VI/1 of the STCW Code at an early stage;
- 5 REQUESTS the Secretary-General, for the purposes of article XII(1)(a)(v) of the 1978 STCW Convention, to transmit certified copies of the present resolution and the text of the amendments contained in the annex to all Parties to the 1978 STCW Convention;
- 6 ALSO REQUESTS the Secretary-General to transmit copies of this resolution and its annex to Members of the Organization which are not Parties to the 1978 STCW Convention.
